What might it look like by 2030?

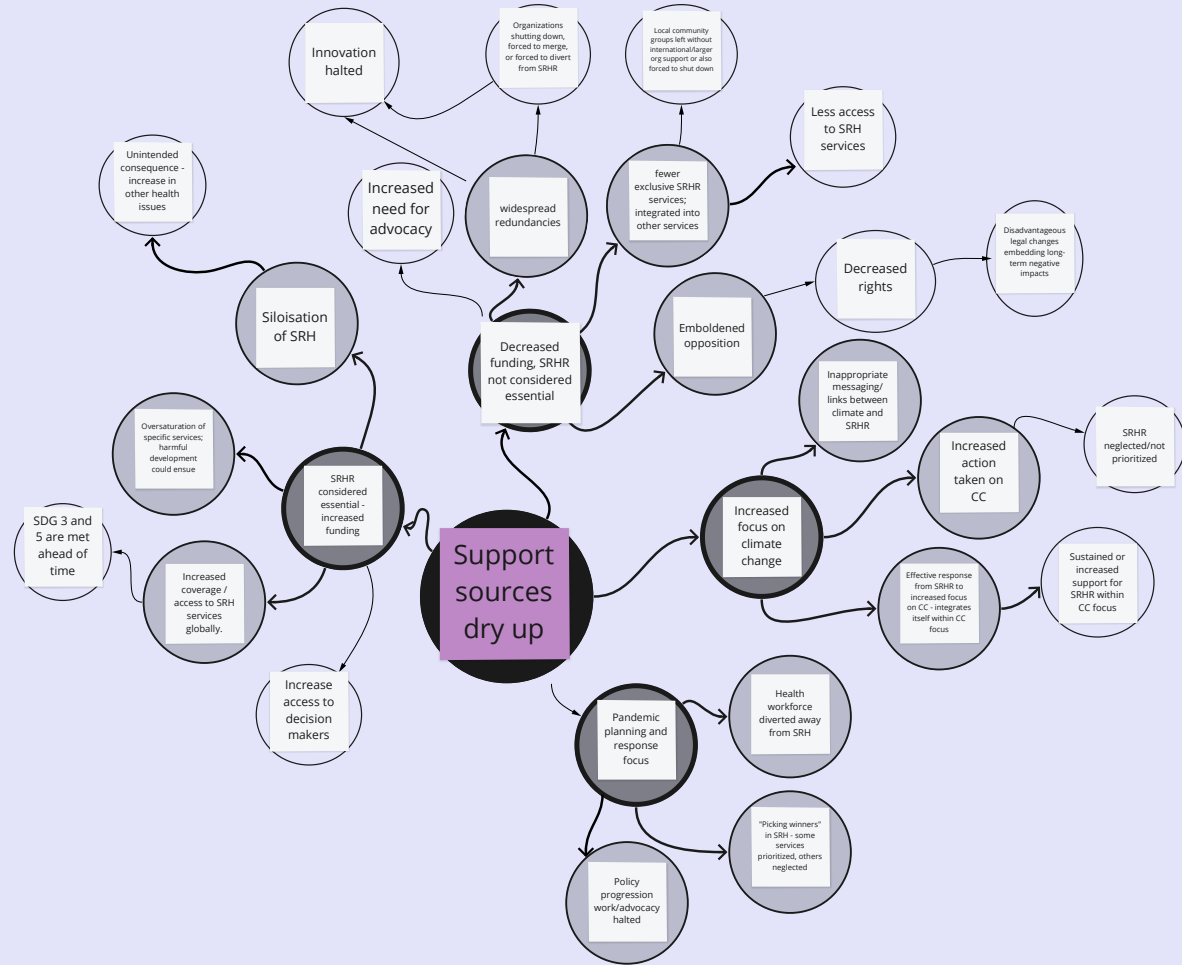
Remember, some impacts are positive, some negative. There can be multiple impacts from each level, and they do not have to exist in the same possible future.

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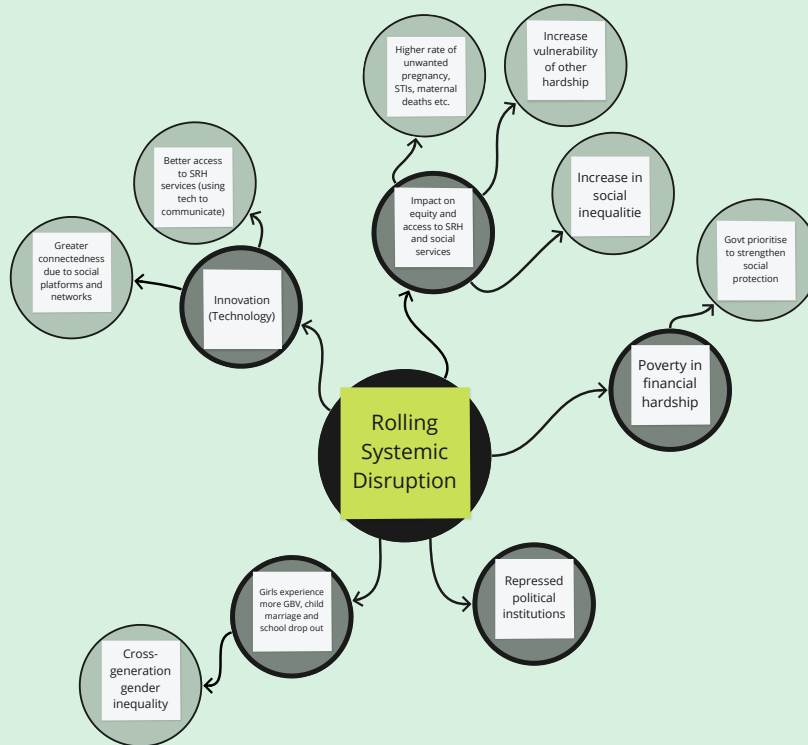
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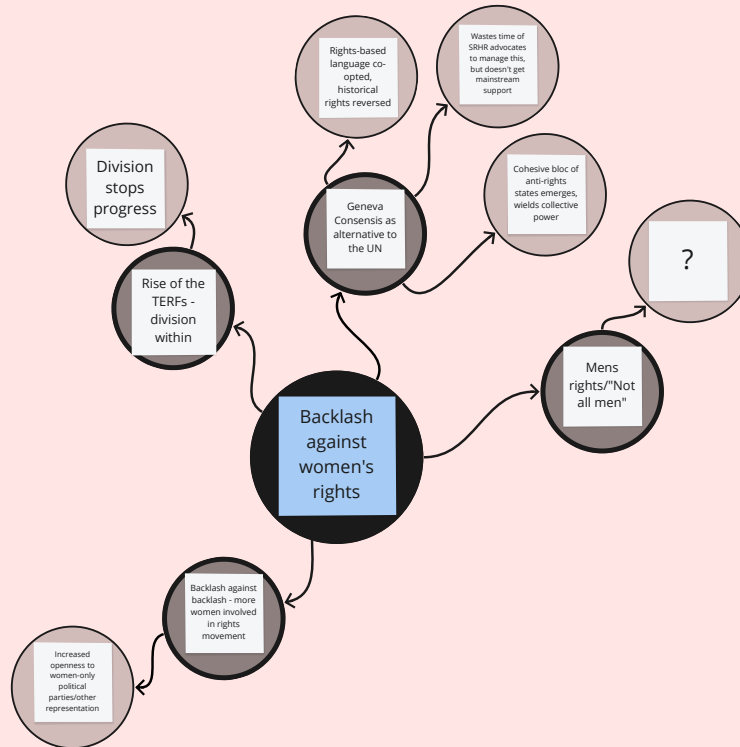
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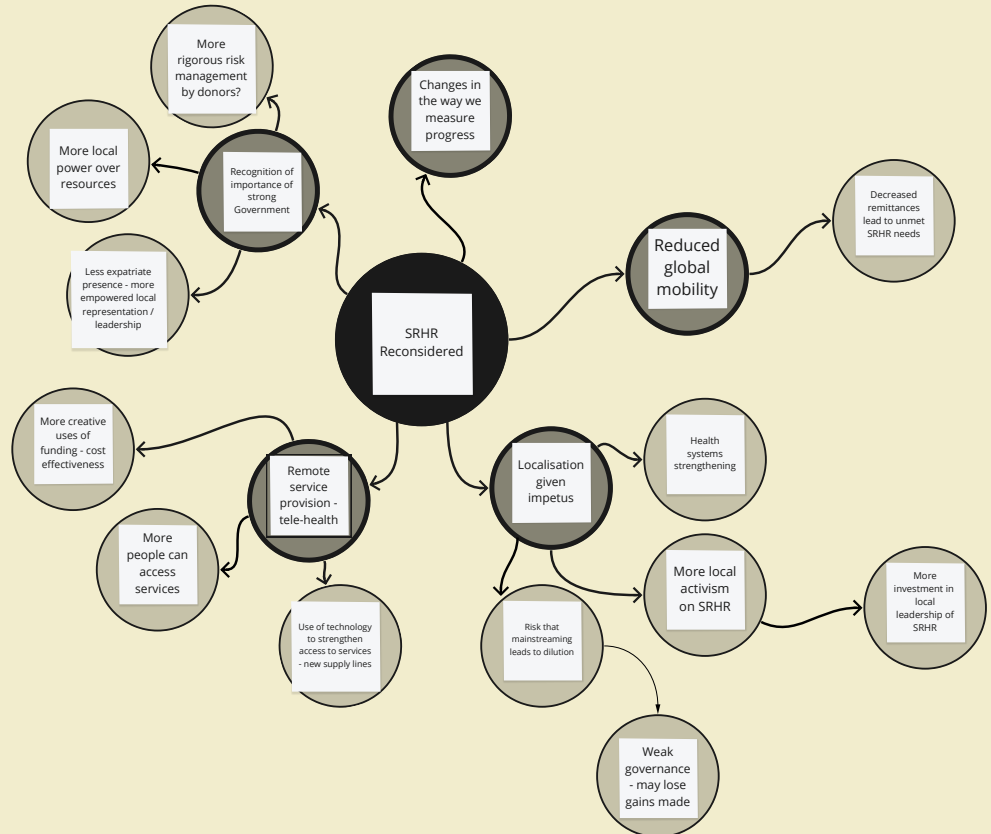
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Were there any surprising outcomes that surfaced in your Futures Wheel?

More priority for strengthening social protection systems

Poverty reduction and more equitable access to services

Backlash against the backlash - led to greater coalition building, critical mass

- Localisation needs to be well managed for women's inclusion and ownership
- Remote access led to wider access to SRHR services

What change was necessary to lead to a more feminist future?

SRHR considered essential in the context of reduced funding (pandemic/climate)

Doing development differently (empower low middle income countries, locally led movements, orgs)

Attitudinal change, particularly among men

- Changes from 2020 became permanent and were built upon
- Restrictions to global mobility under COVID was a catalyst for change

Blue Team

SRHR is considered essential in the context of reduced funding/competing agendas. There is increased access to equitable SRHR globally, and thus SDGs 3 and 5 have been met. SRHR sector follows the principle of health for all (UHC) and ensures respect/focus on broader social support and health care. The value of sustained public funding in social services/health care is embedded in society and respected by governments, guided by the feminist economics and respect for all principles. SRHR actors maintain the pursuit of advocacy regarding importance & value of sustained public funding for and right to equitable health care.

Green Team

Change structural power such as IMF, corporates, international development assistance to achieve gender, economic and climate justice

Pink Team

There's been a backlash to the backlash and people rise up for women's rights. Shifts are taking place in the way we think about unpaid labour, stemming from a shift in societal attitudes towards men's role. COVID exposed the imbalance in unpaid labour and it led to men showing a willingness to cede power in service of greater equality. Women strike en masse and force change!

Yellow Team

Are we still here? Consortium membership different - led by local SRHR actors (& CSOs) communicating directly to government? More funding for SRHR. Globalisation dead or stronger? Localism, regionalism? Global norms but localised action and resource decision making? SRHR does digital become the norm? E.g. female doctors working from home in muslim cultures / contexts. Challenges to quality assure the greatly increased access to information / social media. Dealing with misinformation / disinformation - fact checker?
